



Virtue is a Living Treasure

The formation tidbits for the **2014-15 year** will be based on the virtues associated with the **PROCLAMATION OF THE KINGDOM**, excerpts taken from: "Learning the Virtues that lead you to God" by Romano Guardini. We will look briefly at one virtue each month:

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Truthfulness • Patience • Loyalty • Disinterestedness • Courage • Kindness • Understanding • Courtesy • Gratitude • Unselfishness • Recollection
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April Formation Tidbit: Gratitude

Let us attempt to obtain a view of this gradually disappearing virtue and ask what is necessary so that gratitude may become possible.

Above all there is this: we can be grateful only to a person. Gratitude and petition are possible only between an "I" and a "thou." We cannot thank a law or a company. Gratitude is the expression of a personal encounter in human need.

But two persons, one of whom is situated so that he has something or can do something, while the other has not or cannot, stand face to face. The one asks, and the other is ready; the one gives, and the other thanks; and the two are united by a human tie. Here gratitude is possible, and it becomes a basis for community.

Furthermore, gratitude is possible only in the realm of freedom. True gratitude can exist only in the realm of the voluntary. The more our attitude toward human affairs approaches our attitude toward a machine or a government or a business, the less room there will be for the free response of the heart which says, "I thank you." Its place is taken by the statement that says one has received his due. As soon as there is a "must" or a claim, gratitude loses its meaning.

A third condition necessary for gratitude it this: he who gives the gift must do so with reverence for the one who receives; otherwise he wounds the receiver's self-respect. He must not give with indifference; neither must he play the part of one who condescends; nor must he desire to show his power by the gift. A danger for all in social service is the desire to feel their power, for the person in need is, as such, weaker than the one who helps, and when he thanks for the assistance, he admits his weakness thereby. If there is no mutual respect, gratitude perishes and turns to resentment. Anyone who gives assistance to others should think about that.

But human need is not the only occasion which can give rise to gratitude. Gratitude can spring up wherever kindliness perceives an opportunity to bring joy or create beauty or brighten life. Then the one who is made joyful says, "You have done this. I thank you." This is a fine thing, and if it is really true that the structure of our life leaves less and less room for gratitude, then we should want to seek such opportunities wherever they exist, and create them whenever possible with that power which cannot be overcome, because it is the central power of the heart--- love.
